I spent my summer in a rural Aboriginal community located 3 hours west of Brisbane, the capital of Queensland. I met many wonderful people and even got a chance to work on the Farm, which is the pride of the community as well as a large source of community income.

I spent a lot of my time shifting between helping Uncle Allen (left in the hat) prepare for NAIDOC (National Aboriginal and Islander Day of Celebration) and various other organizations in the community. The picture to the left is of Uncle Allen preparing traditional Aboriginal food called "bush turkey" which includes parrotine, whistling grubs, and "dampn". I also spent time in the school working as a teacher's aid for the second and second grade classes. The picture above is of Miss Franklin's 1st grade class.

Some of the community members think I helped out while in Churinga because → Aboriginal women's conference. I tutored 2 of the local teenagers and that I also attended RAKA meetings which helped Aboriginal legal advice, volunteered with the Aboriginal Health Organisation which was a community based primary care and information group, and collected supplied & distributed information packets for NAIDOC.



NAIDOC is important to us. Community life much of the traditional culture has been lost, and what is still left is going to be gone with the old generation. Part of the celebration included our building a traditional shelter, dancing performed by community members, first traditional food eaten around campfires with the elders and stories about the history of the community.
