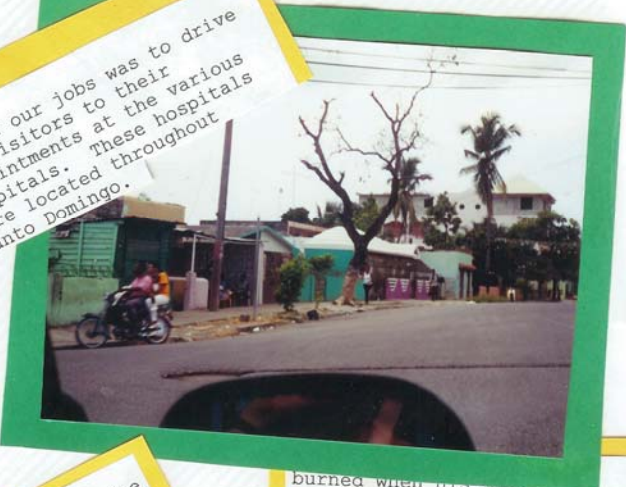


Dancing and music are an important part of the Dominican culture. Here Gabriel is teaching Malisa to dance the merengue.
