## Remembrances

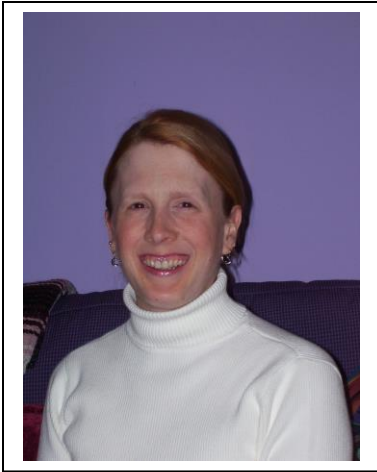
I will always remember how thoughtful people were about contributing to my twenty-fifth anniversary at Siena. Family, faculty colleagues, students, alumni and guests made this a very special day in my life. In so many years there is so much to remember!

Designing and starting the major and achieving the program's initial accreditation were my earliest challenges. Support from colleagues and the college made these tasks possible. In the early days of the program we often struggled with defining social work's "turf" within the college. I enjoyed working with colleagues and students who helped us to refine our place at Siena. I am also proud that my social work colleagues and I have risen to leadership positions in professional social work organizations like CSWE, NASW and BPD. Together, we have moved from "defining out turf" to providing leadership to the profession at local, state and national levels.

I received support from Siena for scholarship and career development. I still find it puzzling how I could have had ten editions of two books published over the years, including Japanese and Chinese Translations. I also remember three sabbatical leaves as highlights of my professional career: Working at Joseph's House Homeless Services, living and teaching at a Tribal College in North Dakota, and helping to design a distance education MSW degree for the state of Alaska. In 1989 Beth accepted an Associate Social Worker position, in Pediatrics, at Albany Medical Center (AMC). She worked mainly in the Cystic Fibrosis Clinic where she helped patients and families adjust to life with chronic illness. While in Pediatrics Beth worked with Siena students fulfilling their service requirements.

After receiving her MSW in 2001 Beth started working as a Psychiatric Social Worker on the inpatient psychiatry unit. Her role was as a Primary therapist and discharge planning coordinator/ consultant for an interdisciplinary treatment team. She maintained a case load of five to eight patients and facilitated group therapy sessions. Beth was also a field instructor for a Siena student whose field placement was on the AMC Psychiatry Unit.

In October of 2004 Beth took a position at Empire Blue Cross/ Blue Shield as a Social Work Case Manager in National Accounts. She coordinates community resources for BC/BS members and is responsible for staff education.

In 2002 Beth joined the Siena Social Work Program Advisory Board. In 2005 she started a two year position as Chair of the Board.

**Reflections from Mary Kate:** In my teenage years I had the opportunity to interact with a number of family friends who were practicing in the field of social work. I recall being drawn to the stories they shared about their professional experiences, and compelled that a degree in social work could allow you to work with so many different populations and have a positive impact on various social systems. I knew from a young age that I wanted to become a social worker!

When I began my college search, I began exploring schools that offered BSW programs and field hockey, as I had a strong interest in continuing my athletic career at the college level. In speaking with students who were enrolled in Siena's social work program at that time, I immediately knew that this was a program where I would gain a quality education with the guidance of dedicated faculty who came from diverse professional backgrounds. There was one consistent theme that I uncovered in my research about the social work program - the knowledge of social work practice and the history of social welfare that I would acquire while obtaining my Bachelor's degree would far surpass that of any other BSW program in the Northeast. While writing one of my many lengthy papers in the second semester of my junior year at Siena, I remember feeling pushed to my absolute limit and I wondered how this would all pay off. Having graduated from the social work program almost 8 years ago, I now look back at that time in my college life and appreciate what I went through as a student.....because of the education I obtained, and individualized attention and never ending support I received from the faculty in the department, I now enjoy a rewarding career practicing in the field. And I could not have been happier when my younger sister decided to apply to the program, because I knew she would benefit from the same exceptional education that I had received.

**Reflections from Anne:** What drew me to the Siena program was definitely influenced by my sister Mary Kate. For my first few years at Siena I had no direction and could not find what my future would hold. I spent many nights talking with my sister about her profession as a social worker and the types of professional attributes that I would acquire. I decided to enroll in the introduction class, and was immediately interested in the history of social welfare and the various systems that social workers work within. I knew the type of education that my sister received from Siena and decided this was the choice for me. I saw the relationships she had with the staff members in the program and understood how unique this major was, aside from all others. I found this in my first meeting with Donna McIntosh, and experienced just what my sister did. A warm environment filled with individuals all working towards the same purpose of assisting others in need. Having a sister who has gone through this program allows me to realize the tremendous experience I will get out of a BSW at Siena, and leads me to look forward to what professional choices I have in the future.

My name is Andrea Pavlis and I am a 2001 alumni of the Social Work Program. After graduation, I pursued my Masters in Social Work at the University of Albany with a special concentration in geriatrics. Soon after I graduated with my Masters, I was employed by St. Peter's Nursing & Rehabilitation Center as the Manager of Social Work Department. In early 2005, I was approached by Siena's Social Work Department about becoming a Field Educator for a senior social work major. As I was listening to the details of becoming a Field Educator, I had flashbacks to my own senior internship and how much I learned from my Field Educator.

Soon after accepting the role of Field Educator, one of my social workers had unexpectedly left the agency. ### **Program Changes and Revisions**

In addition to the numerous forms of outcome data the Program gathers to continually update the curriculum and program, four years ago the Program instituted year end focus groups with our seniors and juniors.

The following are just some examples of ways the program has changed as a result of feedback from students and other outcome data:

\* A change in the field site selection process for the juniors in order to streamline the process. This has included a field site fair where field educators come to campus to meet with students.

\*Changes to the length and format of both the junior orientation and senior field orientation.

\*Adding in a transfer student luncheon with the members of the department as a way to further help transfer students adjust to Siena and the Program.

\*Helping to add a stronger career focus for our students which includes Lunch and Learn presentations by Carla and Joe, inclusion of career options at the student development workshop at the annual conference for the NYSSWEA, posting of job announcements in emails to students and at the office and work to include these options as part of the Program webpage development for the future. We continue to work on this one!
